Course Purpose

In ways that enable you to communicate with and serve-lead others accordingly, you should be gripped in a personal and integrated way by "God's World Mission" as "the living, triune, universal-omnilingual God of the Bible's redemption of the cosmos wherein He grants, among all the world's peoples, faith in Jesus Christ, maturing of the Church, and foretastes of the heavenly city." A corollary purpose is to develop a permeating, instinctive international-Christian self-identity.

Course Objectives

- Instinctively know *God* as the universal-omnilingual Creator-Covenant-King of all peoples
- Hear afresh, with the help of the rest of the universal Church, the biblical meaning of the gospel
- Become more aware of the "world," God's "mission" and the Church's "missions" efforts therein
- Integrate world mission with a Reformed Covenantal theology and worldview
- Identify the current *historical* situation of world mission and missions
- Become conversant with influential missiological concepts and terminology
- Reconsider and plan towards our necessary and particular *involvements* in world mission:
 - Cultivating world mission emphases/programs in/as the local church
 - Going as/sending out/receiving short-/long-term cross-cultural missionaries
 - Money matters
 - On-site tactics, methods, issues
 - Living as Christian people, particularly in (and in relation to) North America
 - Prayer

Requirements

- 1. Class attendance, which will be checked at the beginning of each class period. Unexcused absence from class time exceeding the number of credit hours for the course will result in a deduction from the final grade of five percentage points per hour of such excessive unexcused absence.
- 2. Submit (as with all other assignments, via the Portal; Word format; last name listed first in filename) a 150-200 word self-introduction by 9:45 AM, Tues, Feb 1. Include whatever bio info you decide will help Dr. J. know you and your background. 4% of total grade.
- 3. To help achieve the course objective of becoming more aware of and conversant with the wider world, by 9:45 AM before each Thursday class period (Feb 3 May 5) read 5-7 minutes from each of the following websites: www.worldpress.org, http://english.aljazeera.net, http://www.foxnews.com/, and http://www.operationworld.org (including "Pray Today"). That means approximately 30 minutes of combined time spent on these five websites between Thursday class periods. Indicate your completion of these reading assignments on the Reading Requirements Checklist (to be submitted by 9:45 AM, Thurs, Apr 28 via the Portal (under Req #4); NOTE: Checklists submitted late will cause a one-point course grade reduction per 24-hour period late). 10% of total grade.
- 4. Read the course materials (along with the websites for requirement #2) at a steady pace throughout the course term. 9:45 AM due dates for each item are listed on the attached reading schedule (and Requirement Checklist). You will receive 1.5% credit towards your total course grade for each item completed on time (4% for the Jennings book; 2% credit will be given for completion of this book by the class period after the given deadline.) Indicate your completion of these reading assignments on the Reading Requirements Checklist (submit by 9:45 AM, Thurs, Apr 28 via the Portal; NOTE ONCE AGAIN: Checklists submitted late will cause a one-point course grade reduction per 24-hour period late). 10% of total grade.
- 5. Submit a 500-word analysis of how your understanding of world mission / missions has and has not changed so far during this course. The degree and clarity of self-reflection will be the main criteria for grading. Due by 9:45 AM, Thurs, Mar 10. **10%** of total grade (**5%** possible if submitted by 9:45 AM, Mar 15).
- 6. As your self-selected small group, submit a 2000-word analysis of the development of world mission trends between 1910 and 2010. Evaluation will be based primarily on explicit, critical interaction with class discussions, the required readings, and at least six of the items listed on the two pages of reference reading materials in the course guide (or suitable equivalents. NOTE: Please do not check out any of these materials from the library overnight after spring break). Due by 9:45 AM, Tues, Apr 19. 33% of total grade (16% possible if submitted by 9:45 AM, Thurs, Apr 28).
- 7. As your self-selected small group, take an oral final exam during the 30-minute period (either on projected class dates May 3-5-10 or during the exam period) for which you will sign up. Key preparation will focus on the Reflection Questions in *God the Real Superpower*. **33%** of total grade.
- Bonus Assignment 1: Attend the Feb 26 EMS conference in Chicago; 5% added to total course grade.
- Bonus Assignment 2: Enter Bavinck-related paper contest, expl later; 5% added to total course grade.
